How a Working Mother of Five Rises Above Challenges to Pursue Her Passions in Education

Darline Saeidifar is a master of time management. A veteran of the United States Marine Corp., the mother of five juggles family commitments, a fulltime job at Ford Motor Company, and a standard EMU course load towards her Bachelor's in Early Childhood Development.

Between driving her children to appointments, taking classes on her days off from work, and working on homework in the evenings, there's little time to enjoy for herself—but despite the hard work, she knows there is a rewarding career waiting for her upon graduation.

"Everything I'm going through is worth it to me," Saeidifar says, "because getting a college degree/education is very important and something I have to do for me."

Saeidifar had been out of school for twelve years before selecting Eastern Michigan for a nursing degree. Her father-in-law, an EMU alumnus, had highly recommended she attend, knowing the school would be a great fit for her. A couple years into her degree, Saeidifar made the switch to education, confident this new career path was where she was meant to be.

Saeidifar decided she would pursue her major in Early Childhood Education and give to a child the experience she did not get as a student—the feeling of being welcome and valued. Originally from Port-au-Prince, Haiti, she remembers the difficulty of fitting in with other children in her classrooms, as well as the subsequent bullying and feelings of loneliness she endured growing up.

"I want to provide for every student that walks through my door a place of safety, friendliness and love where they feel important, wanted, and that they matter regardless of their popularity, ethnicity, or if they're from a different country." (Saeidifar)

With the COVID-19 pandemic largely affecting EMU's Winter 2020 semester, Saeidifar has done her best to keep a positive outlook, viewing the long period of free time as a much-needed vacation with her family and noting her thankfulness for having time off work to complete her classes online—the availability of which she found helpful even prior to the stay-at-home order.

Dr. James Barott is a well-known and admired faculty member within the EMU College of Education. For the past 23 years, he has been teaching a wide variety of courses in Educational Leadership and made significant contributions to the success of countless students along the way. Most notably, Dr. Barott has advised and encouraged doctoral students to follow their hearts and pursue dissertation topics they are passionate about.

Having a philanthropic heart to make a difference in the world of education can create effective positive change, and nobody exemplifies that philosophy more than Dr. Barott. Satisfied with the role he has long played in developing the educational leaders of tomorrow, he has announced his retirement after the 2020-21 school year.

23 years ago, Dr. Barott began teaching with the EMU College of Education in a cooperative doctoral program with Grand Valley State University, taking him to numerous branch locations throughout the state in his first five years of teaching. As EMU's Educational Leadership Program moved entirely to the Ypsilanti campus, he

planted roots in the city and went on to teach a variety of doctoral courses including Education Organizations, Organizational Theory, Qualitative Research, Educational Leadership, and more. For his final year, Dr. Barott will be learning to adapt as the 2020-21 school year veers toward a predominantly online schedule.

When asked about his fondest memory working with the EMU College of Education, Dr. Barott proclaimed, "I love the dissertation defenses, and view this as a rite of passage where the individual moves from student to colleague." His greatest accomplishment? Having the privilege to train and develop students who have gone on to become superintendents, principals, university presidents, provosts, deans, educational program managers, and other leadership positions.

During Dr. Barott's last year, he hopes to continue advancing the educational and developmental health and prosperity of the local community, state and nation. He believes great teachers and leaders are extremely important in this time of increased complexity and plans to join in with EMU alumni and colleagues to ensure young people continue to have the best learning experience possible.

Upon retiring, Dr. Barott and his wife plan to move to Cape Cod, MA, where he looks forward to buying a boat and spending his golden years fishing on the bay.
